



Sacramental Information

Baptisms: Parents/guardians are asked to attend a Preparation Seminar scheduled on the second Sunday of the month after 9:00 a.m. Mass (approximately 10:00 a.m.) in the lower-level library. We celebrate Baptisms on the first Sunday of the month during any Mass, and the third Sunday of the month after the 11:00 a.m. Mass. (No Baptisms are scheduled during Lent.) Please call the office to schedule at 281-5105.

Weddings: The parish is happy to celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony with adults who are currently registered members of Immaculate Conception Church (bride or groom). If you are one of many who would like to "come home" to celebrate the Sacrament with family and friends, please provide the name of the parish where you are now a member, along with contact information. We ask that you contact the IC Parish Office a minimum of four months prior to Marriage, but in most cases, couples will need to allow time for Pre-Cana formation, and we suggest beginning to plan your Sacrament 12 or 18 months prior to Marriage. Anointing of the Sick & Funerals: Since individual needs differ, please contact the Parish Office at 281-5105 for pastoral care. Do not hesitate to call; we are grateful for the opportunity to open our hearts to you and your family and offer these sacramental services.

OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults): OCIA (formerly known as RCIA) is for everyone who has been drawn by God to form a deeper relationship. Wherever you are in your faith practice – baptized in another Christian faith, starting from the beginning, or simply enriching your Catholic practice – consider the OCIA. Get to know God better and find out what it means to be Catholic. Individuals will meet with our director of faith formation (Lizanne Young) to discuss the process. We meet as a group on Sundays (from Autumn through the Triduum just before Easter), starting with "Breaking Open the Word" dismissal from 9:00 a.m. Mass, and catechetical sessions from 10:00-11:30 a.m. Contact Lizanne at the Parish Office, 281-5105, ext. 354, or email lyoung@iccmail.org. Reconciliation: Reconciliation is offered from 4:00-4:30 p.m. on Saturdays and by appointment.

SAVE TAXES ON IRA REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTIONS

Individuals subject to Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA) have an opportunity to use the distributions for charitable giving instead of taking a taxable distribution. If you are age 70½ or older, the IRS will allow you to distribute up to \$108,000 annually directly to qualified nonprofit organizations without incurring any taxable income. The benefit is known as the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA, payable to a qualified charity, like Immaculate Conception Church or School. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year, if certain rules are met.

Here are the requirements:

- You must be 70½ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.
- QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary income. This excludes non-deductible contributions.
- The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$108,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA within the same tax year for up to \$108,000.)
- For a QCD to count toward your current year RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally December 31.
- Any amount donated above your RMD does not count toward satisfying a future year RMD.
- The QCD must be paid directly from your IRA to the charity to qualify. In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare. Also, QCDs require that you itemize, which, due to the tax law changes means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.

Funds distributed directly to you, the IRA owner, which you then give to charity do not qualify as a QCD. There are some other tax rules that may also apply to your situation, so consult with a financial professional for more details about this strategy.



Suppet from Mrs. Shea

When I read that this month's Character Trait at ICS was Empathy, I knew that I needed to write to you all about it by sharing a quote from one of my favorite authors, Henri Nouwen.

"When we honestly ask ourselves which person in our lives means the most to us, we often find that it is those who, instead of giving advice, solutions, or cures, have chosen rather to share our pain and touch our wounds with a warm and tender hand. The friend who can be silent with us in a moment of despair or confusion, who can stay with us in an hour of grief and bereavement, who can tolerate not knowing, not curing, not healing and face with us the reality of our powerlessness, that is a friend who cares."

Empathy for someone is simply sitting with them in their emotions. Not trying to change the situation or offer ways to fix it, but seeking to understand their perspective and why they feel the way they do. Empathy requires vulnerability. It requires opening your heart to allow another person's feelings in, knowing that doing so could change us.

I challenge all of us to search our hearts for ways we can be more empathetic this month. Maybe it means calling up that friend who lost a baby to miscarriage and finally meeting for coffee. Maybe it is finally visiting that family member who is homebound after several rescheduled visits. Maybe it is paying for a hot meal and giving it to the homeless person you always see on a street corner. Whatever empathy looks like to you, I pray that your heart may be opened to God's love this month and, really, every month.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

We live always during Advent. We are always waiting for the Messiah to come. The Messiah has come, but is not yet fully manifest. The Messiah is not fully manifest in each of our souls, not fully manifest in humankind as a whole: that is to say, that just as Christ was born according to the flesh in Bethlehem of Judah, so must He be born according to the spirit in each of our souls. – Jean Danielou

Here we find ourselves once again in a familiar place: the beginning of a new Church Year, the beginning of Advent, while others call it the beginning of the Christmas season. In Catholic terms, the Christmas season doesn't begin until Christmas Eve and lasts to the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus. The Church gives us this graced time, Advent, to not only joyfully anticipate the first coming of Jesus at Christmas, but also His Second Coming. We live in and are part of a culture that doesn't spend a whole lot of time reflecting, especially this time of year. We often find ourselves engulfed in the Christmas rush with seemingly endless things we need to do before we celebrate Christmas. This Advent season, I invite you to try to resist all of the Christmas rush and try to spend some time with God in reflection, anticipation and thanksgiving. Our parish can help you with this. I offer you these following opportunities and suggestions:

- · Come to a weekday Mass each week of Advent.
- Come to the Advent Evening of Reflection on December 4th in the church at 6:30 p.m. Prayer, music, stories, Scripture and poetry will be featured.
- All women of the parish are invited to **Advent by Candlelight** on Friday, **December 5th, from 6:30-8:30 p.m.** in the Garden Level.
- Get your heart and soul ready for Christmas by taking advantage of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We will have expanded time for the Sacrament of Reconciliation on Saturdays during Advent from 3:30-4:30 p.m.
- Read a bit of Scripture each day during Advent. The Book of Isaiah, the Advent Prophet, is a good choice.
- Set aside some family time to pray together as you prepare for Christmas.
- Get a religious Advent calendar and count the days to Christmas in a fun and holier way.

I think these suggestions can be helpful to prevent getting caught up in a pre-Christmas rush. This can help us more authentically celebrate Advent rather than pre-Christmas consumerism. Let me close with a story about a Lutheran pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was imprisoned by the Nazis during World War II. It was just before Christmas in 1943 when he wrote: "Life in a prison reminds me a great deal of Advent. One waits and hopes and putters around. But in the end what we do is of little consequence. The door is shut, and it can be opened only from the outside." That describes humanity before Jesus' coming. We were imprisoned by sin. The door was shut and it couldn't be opened, except from the outside. That's what Jesus did; He opened the door!



VOCATION

"I had the great blessing of growing up in a family in which faith was lived in a simple, practical way. However, it was my paternal grandmother in particular who influenced my journey of faith. She was a woman who explained to us, who talked to us about Jesus, who taught us the catechism. The first proclamation is at home, in the family! And this makes me think of the love of so many mothers and grandmothers in the transmission of faith. One day in particular, though, was very important to me: September 21, 1953. I was almost 17. It was "Students' Day." Before going to the celebration, I passed through the parish I normally attended, I found a priest that I did not know, and I felt the need to go to Confession. For me this was an experience of encounter: I found that someone was waiting for me After making my Confession, I felt something had changed. I was not the same. I had heard something like a voice, or a call. I was convinced that I should become a priest."
